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

Today's Mass: THIRD SUNDAY of ADVENT (C)

Zephaniah 3: 14-18; Isaiah 12: 2-6; Philippians 4: 4-7, 8-11; Luke 3: 10-18

The **Entrance antiphon** is taken from today's Second Reading. This is the classic text that gives this Sunday its name: *Gaudete (Rejoice)!* The Collect uses the same word. Rose vestments may be worn and the rose candle is lit on the Advent wreath.

First Reading: beset by personal or family problems, economic hardships, and anxieties about refugees, terrorism and war, not to mention the COVID-19 pandemic, we can easily become fearful and 'let our hands fall limp'. But rather we should shout for joy, for the Lord will come again; God himself has promised it.

Psalm: unusually this is not a psalm but a psalm-like extract from *Isaiah*, echoing the message of the First Reading: "sing and shout for joy".

Second Reading: happiness, says St Paul, comes from tolerance, prayer and thanksgiving, and above all closeness to Christ the Lord, who *"is very near"*.

Gospel: like the other Gospels *Luke* portrays St John the Baptist as a forerunner of Jesus Christ, but alone of the Gospels he also recounts John's ethical teaching. And with John the Baptist there is no pussyfooting about: his demands are simple and clear.



From the Desk of the Parish Priest

Parish Information Document (part 4)

e are now getting to the end of this survey of the Parish Information Document, which is meant to be a handover document whenever a new Parish Priest arrives.

Section 20 is entitled 'Documentation and Parish Records'. This is mainly concerned with ensuring that records are securely kept, as well as helping a new Parish Priest know where records are kept.

Our Parish Registers - Baptism, Confirmation, Reception, Marriage - are all kept in the Parish Office. You can, incidentally, always consult them (eg if you are tracing your family tree) by making an appointment with the Parish Secretary. Our Death Register is computerised.

If you require a Baptism, Confirmation, Reception or (Church) Marriage certificate, just enquire at the Office. If you require a civil Marriage certificate you must, since a recent change in the law, ask the civil Registrar of Births, Marriages and Deaths.

The database of registered parishioners (which is used to send out the weekly email) is kept securely on password protected computers in the Parish Office and my office.

We also have in the Presbytery what is rather grandiosely called the Archive Room. This contains old newsletters, various documents from the past, old Marriage papers and the like, as well as what can only be described as junk. If anyone would like to spend a few days sorting it all out, and properly cataloguing it, let me know.

One question is about a map of the parish. There isn't one: I have never been able to find one and neither has the Diocesan Chancery. The map you may have seen is someone's best guess. We do have a written description of the boundaries, which predates the closure of the Westerham Branch line and the building of the M25, and refers to things that are no longer there or have changed their name. The exact boundaries fall into the category of things only the Holy Spirit knows, I think.

Section 21 - **'Computerisation and Digital Records'** - is mainly about GDPR compliance. The parish database,

as I have said, along with financial records, Gift Aid, and First Holy Communion and Confirmation programme data, are all kept on parish owned computers which are password protected. Physical records, such as the DBS checks, are kept in locked filing cabinets.

The next Section - 'Contact information' - would provide very useful, even necessary information for a new Parish Priest, although in our case the Assistant Priest and the Parish Secretary would know most of it. Who maintains the boilers is a most important thing to know when one has broken down!

It lists CCTV - which we have at Most Holy Trinity, with the appropriate signage - and livestreaming - which we do from St Thomas's, again with the required signage.

The document goes on to enquire about the **Diocesan** rcaos email system. The IT experts who introduced it were not very amused when we pointed out that rcaos (which stands for Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Southwark) would inevitably be pronounced 'our chaos'!

The Parish Secretary, the Parish Clergy, as well as the accountant, Gift Aid co-ordinator, and catechetical co-ordinators, all use the diocesan email system. This ensures that emails are secure and that there is no mixing of parish and private matters.

The Section about **Parish Social Clubs** does not apply in our case. Diocesan policy does not permit new Social Clubs to be initiated.

The final section is **Any other matters**. I haven't thought of anything, but if you have spotted something which ought to be in a Parish Information Document but hasn't been mentioned, let me know.

This document, albeit very useful when there is a change of Parish Priest, is not always the most gripping reading. On the other hand, I hope you have found some of it at least interesting, as it does provide a snapshot into parish life generally as well as parish administration in particular. Many parishioners will be unaware of the volume of behind the scenes activity, undertaken by so many people, to whom thanks is due.

WHY I SHOULD GO TO CONFESSION, THIS CHRISTMAS

Confession seems to have become the awkward family secret within the Catholic Church. Deep down, we know that it is a sacrament of the Church that God wants us to have, and, we know that it ought to be a part of our lives; and yet, somehow, for many, it has just dropped out of the experience of faith.

Advent is a traditional time for us, once more, to make a visit to the Sacrament of Confession, or Reconciliation. Almost by definition this sacrament opens our hearts to receive God, and that is exactly what this liturgical season is about. To that end, you will find, at the back of the Church today, a new booklet giving the reasons - **Why I should go to Confession?** It succinctly explains the reasons for this sacrament, followed by an explanation of how to make an examination of conscience and get the most out of this encounter with the mercy of Jesus Christ. What follows is a short extract...

Why should I go to confession?

Because God asks you to...

In the letter of St. James the Bible teaches: Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous man has great power in its effects (James 5.16). In the end, the main reason for going to confession comes down to our being obedient in love to God; knowing that He never asks us to do anything which is not in our (eternal) best interest.

Because your soul needs it...

If sin is a choice to reject God, then the decision to confess my sin is the opposite: it means I am rejecting sin and embracing God once more. The more I go to confession, the more I am inviting the life of God to come into my soul.

Because a spiritual 'check-up' saves lives...

By making a regular examination of conscience and visit to the sacrament of reconciliation, we are showing our goodwill to God, by giving Him - through the Church - the space to direct us to any place in our lives where our conscience may have become misinformed by "negative influences". If we are doing this, then we can be sure that whatever our level of formation, we at least have an openness to doing God's will.

To be a moral being - which all human beings are - is a weighty matter. Unlike the animals, we bear responsibility for the choices we make, and they have eternal consequences. Entrusting our souls to the care of a confessor is a way of sharing that burden.

Because it is good to talk...

As human beings we are spiritual and physical. It is not enough for us simply to believe that we are forgiven - we need to hear it so we can really know it. Furthermore, it is not good for us to merely interiorly, vaguely say that we are sorry; as human beings our hearts, minds and wills are shaped through forming our interior experience in language that can be expressed in words. The very act of putting into words the things for which we are sorry, and saying those words to another person present to me, brings about conversion to God.

If you have not been to confession in a while, please take away a copy of **Why I should go to Confession** and read through it. Please God, you will receive the grace to return to this important encounter with Mercy.

If, however, having read through the reasons and the guide, you decide that you are still going to stay away from Confession, can I encourage you to write to me, and let me know why? Priests exist to reconcile human beings with God. If the faithful are choosing to stay away from the Sacrament of Reconciliation, as priests we really do need to know why. Oftentimes we are left guessing, but it would be really valuable to hear your experience.
