



Today's Mass: THIRD SUNDAY of the YEAR (Year C)

Nehemiah 8: 2-6, 8-10; Psalm 18; 1 Corinthians 12: 12-30; Luke 1: 1-4, 4: 14-21

First Reading: after the return to Jerusalem of the people from exile, Ezra the scribe reads from the Book of the Law from a wooden dais. This would become the way in which the scriptures were read in the synagogue, and the way in which the scriptures are proclaimed from the Ambo at Mass.

Psalm: a psalm of praise of God, of his word, and of the Law which contains his word.

Second Reading: for Paul the Church is not merely like a human body; it *is* Christ's Body. We become members by Baptism. And although we are different parts of the Body of Christ, we are all equally necessary. Preface VIII of Sundays expresses and develops this concept.

Today we start **Gospel** Readings from *Luke* (known as 'the evangelist of mercy'). Jesus quotes from *Isaiah* 61 – and applies it to Himself - a passage which is fundamental to understanding who Jesus of Nazareth was, and is: he is the Anointed One ('Christ' in Greek, 'Messiah' in Hebrew).

Notice how Jesus read a passage of scripture from a scroll on the Sabbath in the synagogue, after which He preached to the people. This is the basis for our Liturgy of the Word, the first main part of Holy Mass.

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

Sharing the Word of God at Home

n the popular TV programme Antiques Roadshow people bring their treasures to be evaluated by experts. Sometimes the item is valued higher and sometimes lower than the owner's expectations. What are the most valuable items in your house? The Second Vatican Council teaches that "the treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly so that a richer fare may be provided for the faithful at the table of God's Word" (Sacrosanctum Concilium 51). Do you think of the Bible in your house as a treasure, as among your family's most valuable possessions? How can you make the Word of God into a treasure which nourishes and strengthens your family life?

Reading, reflecting, renewing

The most essential thing is to dedicate some family time each week for a brief reading of a Scripture passage, perhaps the Sunday Gospel or other Sunday Reading. Given the hectic pace of life nowadays making family time for Scripture reminds us of the need to put God first; it also enables you truly to make your family a 'domestic Church'.

Choose a comfortable and quiet place in the house, ignoring TVs and online devices. Read the passage aloud, perhaps more than once; allow some time for quiet reflection on it guided by the Holy Spirit; then discuss its meaning and relevance together. Remember that this Scripture reading brings you into a living encounter with Christ, who as the Word of God is present in the Word of God.

Various resources are available to you. Especially useful is the Wednesday Word: simply visit http://www.wednesdayword.org/ and select the Parents icon. This resource enables you to reflect on the forthcoming Sunday's Scriptures. Alternatively, you can take the parish Newsletter home with you and use the centre page to re-read the Scriptures from the previous Sunday. Smaller children respond well to Bible stories: books are available for you to take home (and return) in St Thomas's Entrance.

Above all, consider how the Scripture readings or Bible stories connect to your life and your family life, at age-appropriate levels. Last Sunday's Second Reading for example might lead you to reflect on how you use your God-given gifts for the benefit of Christ's Body on earth, the Church; last Sunday's Gospel might lead you

to pray the *Hail Mary* or to ponder the importance of Marriage in our society.

Praying the Scriptures

Parents and children can choose to integrate family prayer time with Scripture Reading. The Liturgy of the Hours is, after all, Biblical through and through. Go to https://universalis.com/ and click on the appropriate prayers for the time of day. Or the traditional Catholic prayers - such as the Our Father, the Hail Mary, and the Holy Rosary - are taken from Scripture.

Lectio Divina

This is another traditional and practical way to break open God's Word. Through a series of steps - reading, meditation, contemplation, and prayer - Lectio Divina allows the Word of God to speak to you in your situation. Note what Lectio Divina is *not*: it doesn't mean simply reading a passage and then talking, saying what *you* think should happen; rather it means prayerfully listening to what God the Holy Spirit is saying to you.

Food for the Soul

I invite you, as a family, to try Scripture reading as a family. When we read Scripture we encounter the Word of God, which "is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and spirit, of joints and marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart". It is no mere intellectual exercise but a spiritually nourishing feast; the Word of God "serves the children of the Church as strength for their faith, food for the soul, and a pure and lasting fount of spiritual life" (Dei Verbum 21). And remember the old adage: 'the family that prays together stays together'.



'A PERUIT ILLIS' EXTRACT

The Second Vatican Council gave great impulse to the rediscovery of the Word of God, thanks to its Dogmatic Constitution *Dei Verbum*, a document that deserves to be read and appropriated ever anew. The Constitution clearly expounds the nature of sacred Scripture, its transmission from generation to generation, its divine inspiration embracing the Old and New Testaments, and the importance of Scripture for the life of the Church. To advance this teaching, Pope Benedict XVI convoked an Assembly of the Synod of Bishops in 2008 on *"The Word of God in the Life and Mission of the Church"*, and then issued the Apostolic Exhortation *Verbum Domini*, whose teaching remains fundamental for our communities. That document emphasizes in particular the performative character of the Word of God, especially in the context of the liturgy, in which its distinctively sacramental character comes to the fore. It is fitting, then that the life of our people be constantly marked by this decisive relationship with the living word that the Lord never tires of speaking to his Bride, that she may grow in love and faithful witness.

- 3. Consequently, I hereby declare that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God. This Sunday of the Word of God will thus be a fitting part of that time of the year when we are encouraged to strengthen our bonds with the Jewish people and to pray for Christian unity. This is more than a temporal coincidence: the celebration of the Sunday of the Word of God has ecumenical value, since the Scriptures point out, for those who listen, the path to authentic and firm unity. The various communities will find their own ways to mark this Sunday with a certain solemnity. It is important, however, that in the Eucharistic celebration the sacred text be enthroned, in order to focus the attention of the assembly on the normative value of God's word.
- 4. The return of the people of Israel to their homeland after the Babylonian exile was marked by the public reading of the book of the Law. In the book of Nehemiah, the Bible gives us a moving description of that moment. The people assembled in Jerusalem, in the square before the Water Gate, to listen to the Law. They had been scattered in exile, but now they found themselves gathered "as one" around the sacred Scripture (Neh 8:1). The people lent "attentive ears" (Neh 8:3) to the reading of the sacred book, realizing that in its words they would discover the meaning of their lived experience. The reaction to the proclamation of was one of great emotion and tears: "[The Levites] read from the book, from the law of God, clearly; and they gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading. And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, 'This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep'. For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, 'Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions to him for whom nothing is prepared; for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength" (Neh 8:8-10). These words contain a great teaching. The Bible cannot be just the heritage of some, much less a collection of books for the benefit of a privileged few. It belongs above all to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words. At times, there can be a tendency to monopolize the sacred text by restricting it to certain circles or to select groups. It cannot be that way. The Bible is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people.
