


Covid guidance


Following the recent changes in the Bishops' Guidance, note especially

- If you have COVID symptoms stay at home; medical advice should be sought where appropriate;
- Face coverings are no longer mandatory; <u>however</u> those attending church may continue to wear a face covering (both nose and mouth);
- Formal 'social distancing' is not needed, but please be sensitive to the needs of others;
- Good ventilation is still necessary [so wrap up well!];
- It is still good practice to sanitise hands on entry and exit;
- Holy water is now available in the stoups at the Entrances;
- Sanitising of benches is no longer necessary; normal cleaning suffices;
- The *Sign of Peace* is reinstated, but please <u>do not physically touch someone not in your household;</u>
- Holy Communion must continue to be under one kind only; ministers will continue to sanitise hands and wear a face covering when doing so;
- · Social activities (eg coffee after Mass) may resume, where those involved feel safe to do so.

Today's Mass: SIXTH SUNDAY of the YEAR (Year C)

Jeremiah 17: 5-8; Psalm 1; 1 Corinthians 15: 12, 16-20; Luke 6: 17, 20-26

First Reading: speaking through the prophet Jeremiah, God curses those who trust in what is human and who turn away from God (they will die for lack of life-giving water), but blesses those who trust in God, who will flourish like a tree planted beside water.

Psalm: this psalm uses very similar language to the *First Reading*. Happiness comes not by following the way of wickedness or sin but by following the way of goodness, the way of God.

Second Reading: the Corinthians were probably doubting the idea of a bodily resurrection. Paul counters this by insisting that to doubt the resurrection of the dead is to doubt the resurrection of Christ, which is a cardinal tenet of the Christian creed.

Gospel: this is part of what is known as *Luke's* Sermon on the Plain (in comparison with *Matthew's* Sermon on the Mount), and Jesus' teaching is very radical, indeed the opposite of normal thinking then (and indeed nowadays too). The kingdom of God will mean good news for all the people who haven't had any for a long time: the poor, the hungry, those who are hated, blessings on them! Not that there is anything virtuous about being poor, hungry, or persecuted, but God's kingdom will turn this world's injustice upside down.

The Light of Faith

ope Benedict's third Encyclical was not the completion of the three about the theological virtues and about Faith, as one would have imagined. It was called *Caritas in Veritate* ('Love in Truth') and was about the Church's social teaching. Benedict had almost completed a draft of a fourth encyclical - called *Lumen Fidei* ('The Light of Faith') - to complete his trilogy when he resigned. His successor Pope Francis published it in 2013 shortly after he became Pope, and so it is technically an encyclical of Pope Francis although Pope Benedict wrote it, with a few additions by Francis.

Aside from an Introduction and a Conclusion the document has four main chapters. Starting with John 12:46 ("I have come as light into the world, that whoever believes in me may not remain in darkness") Benedict says that there is an urgent need to see faith as a light, "for once the flame of faith dies out, all other lights begin to dim" (§4). Faith is so powerful it can only come as a gift from God.

Chapter 1 is entitled We have believed in Love (cf 1 John 4:16). This chapter looks at the history of faith,

starting as one might expect with Abraham, our father in faith, continuing with the people of Israel (and noting their temptation to unbelief: the opposite of faith is idolatry), and culminating in the fullness of Christian faith. Christ's saving death and resurrection mean that "Christian faith is thus faith in a perfect love, in its decisive power, in its ability to transform the world and to unfold its history" (§15). As the risen one Christ is deserving of faith: "if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile" (1 Corinthians 15:17). "Christ is not simply the one in whom we believe ... he is also the one with whom we are united precisely in order to believe" (§18). As faith is a gift of God we believe in salvation by faith (see Ephesians 2:8) and that faith means a life lived in the Church.

Chapter 2 is *Unless you believe, you will not understand*, a quote from *Isaiah* 7:9. Truth is central to faith: "faith without truth does not save" (§24). This understanding is needed more than ever, given the crisis of truth in our age. Truth is also inseparable from love (not an ephemeral emotion but as an experience of the truth): "without love, truth becomes cold" (§27).

Faith comes from hearing (*Romans* 10:17) and sight (see *John* 11:40). Faith is not opposed to reason, and Benedict refers to Pope St John Paul's Encyclical *Fides et Ratio*: faith and reason strengthen each other. Faith illuminates our search for God and gives rise to Christian theology.

Chapter 3 is I delivered to you what I also received (cf 1 Corinthians 15:3). The Church is the mother of our faith, and faith is transmitted "through the apostolic Tradition preserved in the Church with the assistance of the Holy Spirit" (§40), and is especially passed on in the Creed, the celebration of the Sacraments, the Ten Commandments, and prayer. The faith of the Church has a unity and integrity which means that to deny even one aspect of it distorts the whole.

The fourth and final chapter is *God prepares a City for them (cf Hebrews 11:16)*. Hebrews highlights that for the righteous men and women of the Old Testament (Noah, Abraham, etc) faith was a journey but also a process of building a place where human beings can live together. Faith thus serves the common good, and also is "at the service of justice, law and peace" (§51). Faith helps us to appreciate the union in love of man and woman in marriage and the richness of begetting children. It is so important that in families parents encourage faith in their children so they gradually mature in their own faith.

Faith provides a light for life in society and, by revealing the love of God the Creator, enables us to respect nature all the more. Quoting T S Eliot, the Pope says that "when faith is weakened, the foundations of life also risk being weakened" (§55). Finally, faith gives us consolation and strength amid suffering and, as ever, Mary is the model for our faith.

SYNODAL PROCESS PARISH SUMMARY

4. Prayer and community /example

4.1. Is our prayer life as Catholics deep enough? Several emphasised the importance of the depth of prayer. Some can pray whilst others can work on the practicalities of extending the Church's mission. Non-Catholic ecclesial communities were seen by some as an example in this area (both commitment to prayer and commitment to practical action).



- 4.2. Many other churches are open all day whereas ours is/ are closed. Prayer and the example of prayer (including devotion to the Blessed Sacrament) are seen as tools of evangelisation in themselves.
- 4.3. We need to have "concern for the sacred in our midst"; our actions and initiatives need to have that at the forefront of all planning and execution. Are we really clear "whom we are accompanying"?
- 4.4. Could we offer a post-pandemic retreat to reach out to the marginalised or the 'unchurched'? The view was expressed that not enough has been done during the pandemic to reach out to people who were alone, fearful, unwell etc. We need to have a way of organising ourselves to make this sort of thing happen. The "we want you back" cards are not a substitute for this especially for those who felt 'cut-off' during the height of the pandemic.
- 4.5. 'Big moments' in the life of faith (particularly when young) are seen as important: children's liturgy, open air masses etc as a key means of instilling and sustaining the faith.
- 4.6. It was recognised that our parish has an infrastructure of voluntary groups, including outreach groups: for the bereaved, St Vincent de Paul, Lectio Divina etc. At the same participation is low and/or is disproportionately dependent on the 'older' generation.
- 4.7. Do people know enough about what these groups are (and aren't) and how to get involved? Could we do more to provide information? "We must ensure that the groups aren't 'cliques'".
- 4.8. "One's own example is all-important". A kind word, or a "personal invitation" to the marginalised or person who has been outside the church community for whatever reason.
- 4.9. The greatest witnesses to the faith are "the real stories of holding people in love" at the deepest moments of despair or loss.
- 4.10. A need to "rediscover the zeal and enthusiasm of the early disciples" was identified. Be joyful and unafraid; always have in mind: "I have called you by your name; you are mine".
- 4.11. Our mission is the "spread of God's love. Nothing else". "We must channel God's compassion.....as distinct from our own".
- 4.12. "Liturgy is the means not the end outreach to the poor/marginalised/vulnerable/excluded must follow".
- 4.13. "We need a more visible presence outside the confines of the church building" for example old people's homes, refuge centres, masses in parts of the town or parish not just the four churches including outdoors.
- 4.14. "Could we be more 'imaginative' with the mass so that we reach out to and engage the young?" Considerations around style and timing are very important.
- 4.15. "Communion is us as a community with Jesus Christ". That requires us to know each other share skills, knowledge, help each other only then can we achieve the goal of mission. "We are a pilgrim people journeying together: that journey requires a true community of faith".
- 4.16. Promote the use of prayer apps, Zoom/Teams rosary sessions etc which are accessible/convenient and can cross parish (and even international) boundaries. Our social media presence is seen as weak and it is this that can appeal to many these days. The newsletter needs to include more on 'spiritual nourishment' it is seen by some as 'textbook' and not inspirational.
- 4.17. Grandparents have a role to play in passing on the faith; conversations with grandchildren (including adult grandchildren) can sometimes have a resonance that a parent/child conversation cannot (for whatever reason) achieve. How can we nurture this?
- 4.18. Given the size and geographical spread of our parish, we need to work hard at maintaining the feeling of community. This is not helped by not having a parish hall. There is also a feeling that the sense of community is likely to be much stronger at the outstations than at St Thomas's; we need to think carefully about the position at St Thomas's.
- 4.19. There is room for a lot more 'statesmanship' at the Diocesan level (and/or Bishops' Conference level) on regional/national and international issues. The voice of the Church should be heard and not confined to the faithful.
