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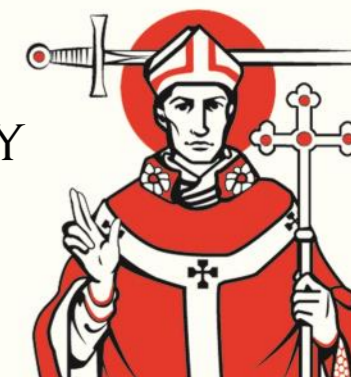

Today's Mass: THIRD SUNDAY of LENT (Year C)

At Masses except the 11:15am Mass:

Exodus 3: 1-8, 13-15; Psalm 102; 1 Corinthians 10: 1-6, 10-12; Luke 13: 1-9

First Reading: on Mt Horeb (also known as Mt Sinai) Moses encounters God ('I Am') in the burning bush who promises, in his compassion for his people, to deliver them from slavery in Egypt.

Psalm: a psalm of praise and thanksgiving to God, who 'is compassion and love'.

Second Reading: during the Offertory the priest takes the chalice and says the wine 'will become our spiritual drink', a phrase taken from this passage.

Gospel: the parable of the fig tree is one of the many 'parables of mercy' to be found in *Luke*. If we understand the vine dresser to be God, then the parable speaks of how God will give the sinner more time to repent and start doing good works. If the vine dresser stands for the Christian disciple, it encourages us to give offenders a second chance and to expend effort ('*time to dig round it and manure it*') in helping them rehabilitate.

At the 11:15am Mass: Exodus 17: 3-7; Psalm 94; Romans 5: 1-2, 5-8; John 4: 5-42

These Year A readings are used when those on the RCIA programme have their First Scrutiny. The *Gospel* story of the Samaritan woman at the well - with its themes of water, true worship, belief in Christ, and conversion of others - has a clear meaning to those preparing for Baptism and Reception into the Church, but also for the rest of us these readings speak of profound realities of eternal life and true prayer. The First Scrutiny and Presentation of the Creed - after the Homily - replace the usual Bidding Prayers.

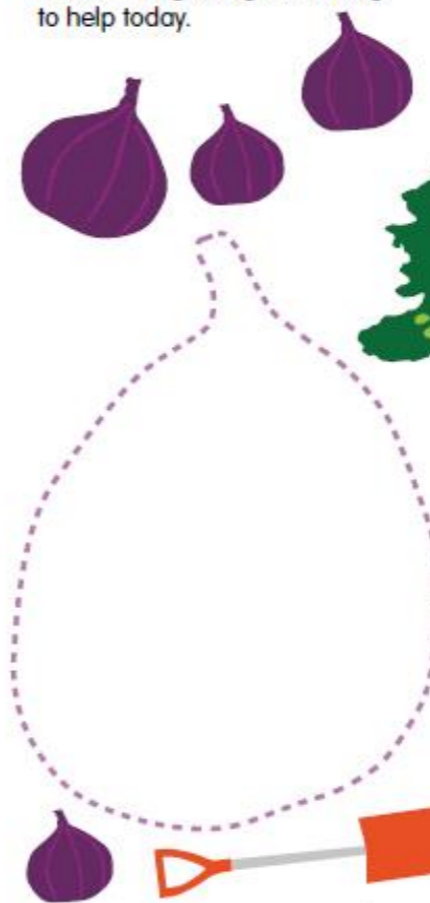

You are invited to join in the Rosary after each Sunday Mass until Easter to pray for peace in Ukraine. If the weather is fine we will congregate in the garden at Our Lady's shrine or, if wet, remain in the church.

SVP Palm Sunday Second Collection

The parish SVP is making the whole focus of this year's Palm Sunday second collection those who are suffering in Ukraine from the tragic events resulting from the invasion of that country. The collection will be sent to DePaul International, the world umbrella body for national SVPs. They, and most other charities, believe that it is important to provide money to organisations on the spot, rather than trying to collect and ship clothes and other supplies, as they are in the best position to know what is needed and where. This will also get round the problems of shipping sometimes bulky goods across Europe, with the delays that that will entail.

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

The Gospels of the Sundays in Lent 3

Today's Gospel (except when the Year A Readings are used for the Scrutinies) is the Parable of the Fig Tree. What lessons does it give us as we continue our Lenten journey?

The Gospels aside, we know that Pontius Pilate, the Governor of Judaea, was a nasty piece of work. The Jewish historian Josephus recounts many episodes in which Pilate trampled on the people's sensibilities. One of these was an incident when Pilate had some pilgrims offering sacrifice in the Temple slaughtered, perhaps fearing a riot. The Gospel speaks of the pilgrims' blood being "*mingled with that of their sacrifices*". On top of the human tragedy this polluted the very holiest of places for the Jews.

We don't know of the other incident, to which Jesus refers, but presumably there was some sort of building accident at Siloam (which is just south of the Temple) which killed many people.

"Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices". The people are not just telling Jesus the latest news. Remember, He has come up to Jerusalem from Galilee, at the head of a group of pilgrims. They are really asking if Jesus intends to continue His journey, despite what might happen to Him. Secondly they are also asking what this all means: were the Galileans punished and is there worse to come?

In His reply Jesus addresses the second of these unspoken questions. (We know the answer to the first unspoken question: of course Jesus will and must continue, even to His death.) The pilgrims killed by Pilate, like the victims of the tower collapse, were no more sinful than anyone else. This, incidentally, gives us our belief that if something horrible happens to a person it is not because God is punishing them for some transgression.

Jesus' reply is the key to understanding this passage: "*unless you repent you will all perish as they did*". Jesus isn't talking about perishing in hell after they die. What He means - in this and other passages in this section of the Gospels - is that those who refuse his summons to repent, to change direction, to abandon the fight against the Roman occupiers, will suffer the consequences. If the people of Jerusalem ignore His call to repentance they will perish by the sword at the hands of the Romans or perish in the inevitable siege

which would follow an armed rebellion. Those who take the sword will perish by the sword.

Jesus' warning about the consequences of not heeding his call is elaborated by the, at once humorous and sinister, parable of the fig tree in the vineyard. Fig trees were often planted in vineyards, as they help the grapes. There are two ways of understanding the parable.

Jesus Himself could be the vineyard-owner, and the three years could refer to his period of public ministry, in which He has preached repentance but found very little of it. He is prepared to give the people of Jerusalem one last chance to repent. If they refuse, their doom is sealed.

Alternatively, perhaps the vineyard-owner is God, seeking fruit, and the man who looks after it is Jesus. In this case God's patience is wearing thin but Jesus is trying to restore the tree to life in one last attempt to avoid its final verdict.

Either way, the end result is the same: "*if not, then you can cut it down*". We know that - after declining to follow the way of peace Jesus advocated - the people of Jerusalem suffered the destruction of the Temple in AD70.

Today's Gospel asks many questions of us. What is going on in our world today? How is God involved? What is God doing in our own lives? Are we bearing fruit for God's kingdom? Do we repent and turn away from earthly ways so as to follow the way of Christ, the way of self-sacrificing love?



THE 12 MARKS OF A DISCIPLE

from the diocesan website

1. Disciples are called - Jesus invited the fishermen to leave their nets and follow him. God always initiates the relationship and pursues us first, for he *'came to seek out and to save the lost.'* (Lk 19:10).
2. Disciples accept Jesus' call - The choice to be a disciple is an intentional one, which one must make in response to God's love for us.
3. Disciples trust God - Just as Peter and Andrew *'left their nets and followed him'*, discipleship often means leaving our past behind and following Jesus with faith. (Mt 4:20).
4. Disciples love others - Jesus said that *'by this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'* (Jn 13:35)
5. Disciples bear spiritual fruit. The fruit in our lives proves that we are disciples of Christ, as we continue to abide in him, the true Vine.
6. Disciples obey their master - Jesus said that we are his friends if we do what he has commanded (Jn 15:14). Obedience deepens our intimacy with the Lord.
7. Disciples are docile - This means that disciples of the Lord are teachable. Whatever they learn from Jesus, they try to implement in their own lives.
8. Disciples spend alone time with Jesus - The disciples were Jesus' closest friends. They shared some of their most intimate moments with him. As disciples, we are called to invest in our relationship with the Lord, by spending quality time with him in prayer and Eucharistic Adoration.
9. Disciples carry their cross - Jesus said *'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me.'* (Lk 9:23) Suffering is part of the cost of discipleship.
10. Disciples serve others - When feeding the five thousand, the disciples volunteered to distribute the food. In the same way, disciples are called to serve others through the seven corporal acts of mercy.
11. Disciples are committed - Discipleship requires that no one looks back when following Jesus. Disciples set their eyes on the treasures of heaven and keep an eternal perspective.
12. Disciples evangelise - Disciples share the gift of the Gospel and make other disciples. The joy of knowing Jesus overflows in their lives that they feel compelled to share the Good News of what Jesus has done for them with others.
