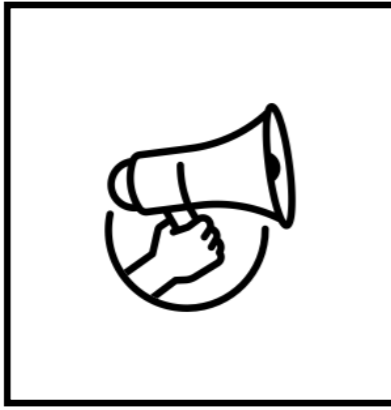
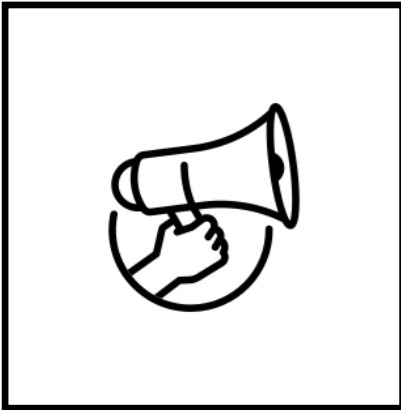
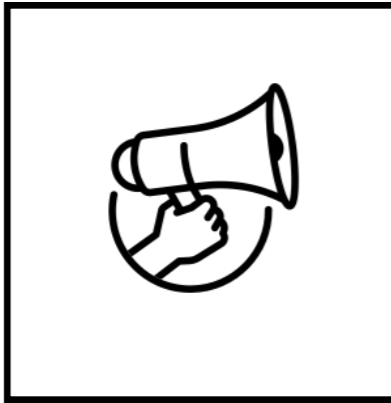

Today's Mass: FIFTH SUNDAY of LENT (Year C)

At Masses except the 11:15am Mass:

Isaiah 43: 16-21; Psalm 125; Philippians 3: 8-14; John 8: 1-11

First Reading: Isaiah recalls the wilderness wandering in *Exodus* and *Numbers*, but above all looks forward to the saving power of God to be experienced in the future.

Psalm: a psalm of joy to come and hope in salvation from God.

Second Reading: Paul tells his personal story to emphasise the importance of renouncing self and accepting Christ Jesus as Lord.

Gospel: Jesus' reaction to the woman caught in adultery. He does not condone adultery ('*don't sin any more*') but nor does he condone the woman's condemnation to death. Why does he not condone her killing? Because it would prevent her redemption by preventing her repentance. Likewise we must not drive adulterers and other sinners away, but give them chance to repent and be reconciled.

At the 11:15am Mass: Ezekiel 37: 12-14; Psalm 129; Romans 8: 8-11; John 11: 1-45

These Year A readings are used when those on the RCIA programme have their Third Scrutiny. The *Gospel* is the last and greatest of the 'signs' in the Fourth Gospel, the raising of Lazarus. Confronted with the finality of death, Martha makes a profession of faith similar to St Peter's: "*I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God*". Jesus responds with his famous revelation: "*I am the resurrection and the life*". The key to receiving this resurrection and (eternal) life is faith, faith in Jesus Christ.

What is Jesus like?

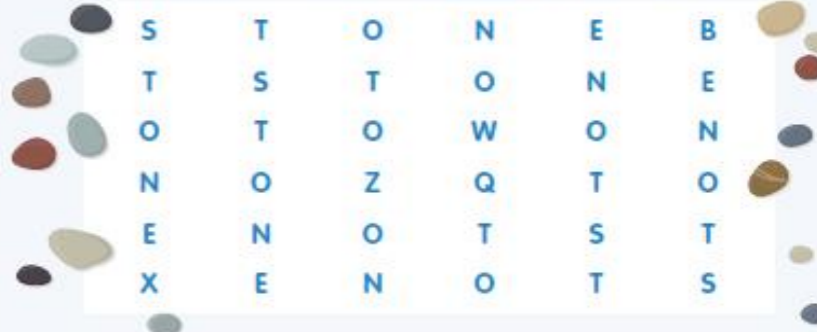
Choose which words tell us what Jesus was like. Draw a ring round each of them.

How many times can you find the word "stone" in the word square?

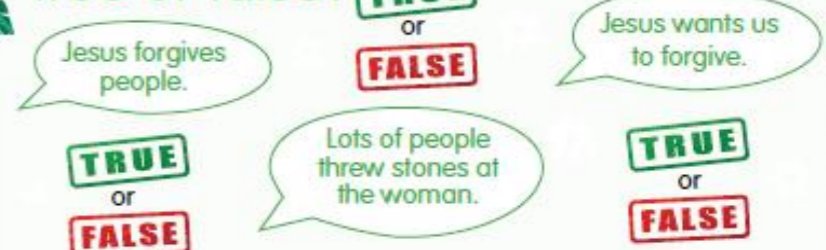


Spot the difference

The Second Collection on Good Friday is for the Holy Places, to help in the upkeep of churches, schools etc in the Holy Land. Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence, Holy Saturday a day of fasting until the Vigil.



Today's Gospel - the Woman Caught in Adultery - from *John's* Gospel has produced a joke, which I hope you won't find sacrilegious. Jesus says 'Let anyone who has not sinned throw a stone'. One stone wizzes through the air and hits the woman. Jesus turns and says 'Mother, I have told you before not to interfere'.

The portrayal here of the mercy of Jesus is as expressive as anything in *Luke*, the 'Gospel of Mercy'. Jesus is pictured as the serene judge, majestic yet forgiving. It is a moment of high drama, captured in Augustine's succinct summary: *relictis sunt duo, misera et misericordia* ('two were left, one miserable the other mercy'). And to quote Raymond Brown in his Commentary: 'the delicate balance between the justice of Jesus in not condoning the sin and His mercy in forgiving the sinner is one of the great gospel lessons'.

Why the scribes and Pharisees bring the adulteress to Jesus - in their eyes a disreputable itinerant preacher - rather than dragging her before the Sanhedrin court is not quite clear. What is clear is the nature of the trap they set. If He decides in favour of the woman and orders her release, He violates the clear prescriptions of the Mosaic law about a married woman who commits adultery. If He orders her to be condemned and stoned, He will be in trouble with the Romans as someone who disturbs the peace and will contravene his oft stated views on forgiveness. It is similar to the trap of the Roman coin in *Mark* 12: 13-17.

Understanding this passage centres on verse 7: "*If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her*". Jesus is not here saying that sins of the flesh are not that important; witness His last words "*do not sin any more*". Nor is He saying that every judge must be sinless in order to judge others, a principle which would render the office of judge impossible to discharge. Neither is Jesus making a general statement forbidding capital punishment.

He is dealing with zealots who have taken it upon themselves to enforce the law harshly, perhaps as a sort of lynch mob. Jesus, probably mindful of *Exodus* 23: 1-9, is demanding that their case is thoroughly lawful and that their motives are honest. Although they appear zealous about enforcing the law, they are not really concerned about the real purpose of the law, and they are equally unconcerned about the woman's spiritual state. We don't know if she was penitent or not. In truth they are using her as a pawn to entrap

Jesus. Their motives are base and so their actions are not according to the law.

By the way, what does Jesus writing in the sand mean? We don't really know; various hypotheses have been put forward. Perhaps Jesus was simply playing for time, thinking about it, or trying to look imperturbable and serene.

The message for us, hearing the Gospel today, is not difficult to identify. First, are we judgemental, despite being sinners ourselves? It is very easy to fall into the trap of condemning someone but doing so out of unworthy motives, and pursuing the case harshly and without mercy. We can all be self-righteous and hypocritical if we are not careful. Or does this incident cause us to realise that we are sinners and deserve punishment? We should remember the mercy extended to us by God, and seek to be ministers of God's reconciliation in the world.

Secondly, the story illustrates the harmony of justice and mercy in Christ's salvation. God, at the Day of Judgement, will pronounce sentence on the sinner, but he provides a way to escape condemnation, if we turn away from sin and embrace a life of holiness.

Thirdly, Jesus perfectly exemplifies the old maxim *hate the sin, love the sinner*. This is so hard to do in practice, but Jesus here shows us how to do it. He condemned the sin but not the person. He gives her the chance to repent of her sin and thus achieve redemption. Mercy prevails over sin; this does not mean that justice is forgotten. On the contrary, mercy restores a right relationship with God. Furthermore, mercy always calls the sinner to repentance and conversion.



EXTRACTS FROM POPE FRANCIS' HOMILY
AT THE CONSECRATION OF RUSSIA AND UKRAINE
TO THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

All too often, we think that Confession is about going to God with dejected looks. Yet it is not so much that we go to the Lord, but that he comes to us, to fill us with his grace, to fill us with his joy. Our confession gives the Father the joy of raising us up once more. It is not so much about our sins as about his forgiveness. Our sins are present but the forgiveness of God is always at the heart of our confession. Think about it: if our sins were at the heart of the sacrament, almost everything would depend on us, on our repentance, our efforts, our resolves. Far from it. The sacrament is about God, who liberates us and puts us back on our feet.

Let us recognize once more *the primacy of grace* and ask for the gift to realize that Reconciliation is not primarily our drawing near to God, but his embrace that enfolds, astonishes and overwhelms us. The Lord enters our home, as he did that of Mary in Nazareth, and brings us unexpected amazement and joy - the joy of forgiveness. Let us first look at things from God's perspective: then we will rediscover our love for Confession. We need this, for every interior rebirth, every spiritual renewal, starts there, from God's forgiveness. May we not neglect Reconciliation, but rediscover it as *the sacrament of joy*. Yes, the sacrament of joy, for our shame for our sins becomes the occasion for an experience of the warm embrace of the Father, the gentle strength of Jesus who heals us, and the "maternal tenderness" of the Holy Spirit. That is the heart of Confession.

In these days, news reports and scenes of death continue to enter our homes, even as bombs are destroying the homes of many of our defenceless Ukrainian brothers and sisters. The vicious war that has overtaken so many people, and caused suffering to all, has made each of us fearful and anxious. We sense our helplessness and our inadequacy. We need to be told, "Do not be afraid". Yet human reassurance is not enough. We need the closeness of God and the certainty of his forgiveness, which alone eliminates evil, disarms resentment and restores peace to our hearts. Let us return to God and to his forgiveness.

Today, renewed by forgiveness, may we too knock at the door of her immaculate heart. In union with the Bishops and faithful of the world, I desire in a solemn way to bring all that we are presently experiencing to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. I wish to renew to her the consecration of the Church and the whole of humanity, and to consecrate to her in a particular way the Ukrainian people and the Russian people who, with filial affection, venerate her as a Mother. This is no magic formula but a spiritual act. It is an act of complete trust on the part of children who, amid the tribulation of this cruel and senseless war that threatens our world, turn to their Mother. It is like what young children do when they are scared; they turn to their mother for protection. We turn to our Mother, reposing all our fears and pain in her heart and abandoning ourselves to her. It means placing in that pure and undefiled heart, where God is mirrored, the inestimable goods of fraternity and peace, all that we have and are, so that she, the Mother whom the Lord has given us, may protect us and watch over us.

Mary then uttered the most beautiful words that the angel could bring back to God: "Let it be to me according to your word" (v. 38). Hers was no passive or resigned acceptance, but a lively desire to obey God, who has "plans for welfare and not for evil" (Jer 29:11). Hers was the most intimate sharing in God's plan of peace for the world. We consecrate ourselves to Mary in order to enter into this plan, to place ourselves fully at the disposal of God's plans. After having uttered her "Fiat", the Mother of God set out on a long journey to the hill country, to visit a relative who was with child (cf Lk 1:39). She went with haste. I like to think of this image of Our Lady going with haste. She comes with haste to help and take care of us. May she now take our own journey into her hands: may she guide our steps through the steep and arduous paths of fraternity and dialogue, along the way of peace.
