



Today's Mass: FIFTEENTH SUNDAY (Year C)

Deuteronomy 30: 10-14; Psalm 68; Colossians 1: 15-20; Luke 10: 25-37

First Reading: Moses lays down the law (literally) which the People of God must obey. It is interpreting this law which gives rise to the lawyer's question in today's *Gospel*.

The **Psalm** fits in well with today's *Gospel*, with its references to compassion for the poor and needy.

Second Reading: a Christological hymn, thought by scholars to be St Paul's correction of a hymn in use at Colossae. It highlights the mediation of Christ, first in the beginning in creation, then by His Resurrection in reconciliation.

Gospel: the parable of mercy we call the parable of the Good Samaritan is one of Jesus' most provocative parables. True compassion leads to helping someone in need; as St Ambrose said, 'Mercy, not kinship, makes someone a neighbour'.

We could read it as Jesus being the good Samaritan. But the Christian community and all individual Christians are also called to be the good Samaritan. Love of God cannot be separated from love of neighbour.





Since that time, I am deeply grateful for the pastoral care offered to Kent by Mgr Matthew Dickens, and subsequently by Mgr Canon John O'Toole, who retired at Easter due to ill health, and whom we continue to keep in our thoughts and prayers.

As you are aware, I have asked for replacement Auxiliary Bishops, but a favourable response to my request is not guaranteed, or indeed quick — and so we wait in joyful hope.

Meanwhile, I am aware that Kent has been without an episcopal presence for some time now, and so I have asked Bishop Paul Hendricks to move from the South West Area to Kent – which he has generously agreed to do."

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

Some thoughts from the Synodal process 1

cannot write about every comment made in the parish Synodal process, and it would it be inappropriate for me to do so, but there are some reflections I can usefully make.

Someone (I don't of course know who said what) expressed the view that "the Church is seen to exclude for example - the "divorced and remarried"; the LGBT community". Please note that I am not criticising the person who said this; on the contrary, I think the person has made a valid point.

The key point I wish to make is this: where does this perception that the Church excludes certain people come from?

Now, if a drunk, drugged, deranged came to Mass waving an axe, it is likely that the welcomers would seek to exclude the person – for everyone's safety – and ring 999 for the police. But apart from such an unlikely scenario, no one stands in the church Entrance excluding anyone. In fact it is rather the opposite: our welcomers are polite and, well, welcoming. And although occasionally a parishioner might glare at a very noisy infant I have never seen anyone even tut disapprovingly at someone whose lifestyle they consider to be immoral.

Is it that people in these supposedly excluded categories are regularly denounced in homilies and the likes? Hardly. Bishops, Priests and Deacons are always careful to express the Church's teaching on moral issues like marriage and homosexuality in positive terms. We may, for instance, preach about Marriage as being instituted by God himself and about the beauty of the marital relationship. It does not follow that we are therefore excluding from Church those who are not married. If this were the case I would be excluding myself and all the priests who promised celibacy at our Ordination.

No. It quickly becomes clear that the mainstream media portray religious believers — Christians, Moslems, Jews, etc — as being excluding. We have seen this in America in the aftermath of the reversal of the Roe v Wade decision. The media depict this as right wing religious people depriving women of their rights. In fact, the Supreme Court said that abortion is such a profound issue that it must be decided not by a few unelected (and nearly all elderly male) judges but by democratically elected legislatures (which in the USA means each individual state).

A perfect example of my point was the recent fuss in John Fisher School, Purley. The diocesan education authorities prevented a man from speaking in the school. His writings are dreadfully blasphemous (so bad I will not repeat them: you will have to find them online yourself if you wish to) and who advocates unlawful underage sex. The reason for the ban was his potentially criminal (under the CPS definition of "hate crime") religious prejudice and contravention of Safeguarding regulations. Yet the secular press reported this as the Catholic Church being 'anti gay'. The person's homosexuality was not the issue, but many people will have got the impression that it was.

The Church teaches that <u>every</u> Catholic has an obligation (except for a genuine reason) to attend Holy Mass on a Sunday and Holyday. We are <u>all</u> sinners; no one is perfect yet, and I bet you have often heard in a homily that the preacher includes himself as a sinner if he is talking about sin. I, and every Priest, have to go to Confession just as often as you do, perhaps more often.

At Sunday Mass, therefore, there will be people whose lifestyle might not be completely in accord with the Church's moral teaching. Actually, that sentence is incorrect: it should read 'At Sunday Mass every person present will have a lifestyle not completely in accord with the Church's teaching'. The point is that we realise that we are sinners and need Christ's teaching and grace to sanctify us so we can withstand the Day of Judgement.

The original comment refers to rules about receiving Holy Communion: in this context the important point is that there are many people at Mass who do not or should not receive Holy Communion: non Catholics and non Christians, those who have not fasted, those who are conscious of needing to confess sins before receiving, those not yet of the age of reason, those who have already received, and so on, quite apart from those in the categories of people who should not receive. So no one should ever look disparagingly at someone who does not receive Holy Communion.

Also, inclusion does not mean everyone should be allowed to do everything. Must the choir accept people who can't sing or must someone who can't play it be allowed to play the organ? Must I (an ignoramus in this) be included on the flower rota? Does inclusion mean that men must be included in the Union of Catholic Mothers or teenagers in the Pilgrims group?

A final question remains, and it is an important one. If it is modern media who are responsible for this widespread perception that the Church excludes certain people – when the opposite is in fact the case – how do we counteract this? Feel free to email me with suggestions and we can print them (anonymously) in this Newsletter.

EXTRACTS FROM 'DESIDER IO DESIDER AVI'

"I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer" (Luke 22: 15). These words of Jesus, with which the account of the Last Supper opens, are the crevice through which we are given the surprising possibility of intuiting the depth of the love of the persons of the Most Holy Trinity for us.

Peter and John were sent to make preparations to eat that Passover, but in actual fact, all of creation, all of history — which at last was on the verge of revealing itself as the history of salvation — was a huge preparation for that Supper. Peter and the others are present at that table, unaware and yet necessary. Necessary because every gift, to be gift, must have someone disposed to receive it. In this case, the disproportion between the immensity of the gift and the smallness of the one who receives it is infinite, and it cannot fail to surprise us. Nonetheless, through the mercy of the Lord, the gift is entrusted to the Apostles so that it might be carried to every man and woman.

No one had earned a place at that Supper. All had been invited. Or better said: all had been drawn there by the burning desire that Jesus had to eat that Passover with them. He knows that he is the Lamb of that Passover meal; he knows that he is the Passover. This is the absolute newness, the absolute originality, of that Supper, the only truly new thing in history, which renders that Supper unique and for this reason "the Last Supper," unrepeatable. Nonetheless, his infinite desire to re-establish that communion with us that was and remains his original design, will not be satisfied until every man and woman, from every tribe, tongue, people and nation (Rev 5:9), shall have eaten his Body and drunk his Blood. And for this reason that same Supper will be made present in the celebration of the Eucharist until he returns again.

The world still does not know it, but everyone is *invited to the supper of the wedding of the Lamb* (Rev 19: 9). To be admitted to the feast all that is required is the wedding garment of faith which comes from the hearing of his Word (cf. Rom 10:17). The Church tailors such a garment to fit each one with the whiteness of a garment *bathed in the blood of the Lamb*. (Rev 7:14). We must not allow ourselves even a moment of rest, knowing that still not everyone has received an invitation to this Supper or knowing that others have forgotten it or have got lost along the way in the twists and turns of human living. This is what I spoke of when I said, "I dream of a 'missionary option', that is, a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything, so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channelled for the evangelization of today's world rather than for her self-preservation" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, n. 27). I want this so that all can be seated at the Supper of the sacrifice of the Lamb and live from Him.

Before our response to his invitation — well before! — there is his desire for us. We may not even be aware of it, but every time we go to Mass, the first reason is that we are drawn there by his desire for us. For our part, the possible response — which is also the most demanding asceticism — is, as always, that surrender to this love, that letting ourselves be drawn by him. Indeed, every reception of communion of the Body and Blood of Christ was already desired by him in the Last Supper.

If we had somehow arrived in Jerusalem after Pentecost and had felt the desire not only to have information about Jesus of Nazareth but rather the desire still to be able to meet him, we would have had no other possibility than that of searching out his disciples so that we could hear his words and see his gestures, more alive than ever. We would have had no other possibility of a true encounter with him other than that of the community that celebrates. For this reason the Church has always protected as its most precious treasure the command of the Lord, "Do this in memory of me."

From the very beginning the Church was aware that this was not a question of a representation, however sacred it be, of the Supper of the Lord. It would have made no sense, and no one would have been able to think of "staging" — especially before the eyes of Mary, the Mother of the Lord — that highest moment of the life of the Master. From the very beginning the Church had grasped, enlightened by the Holy Spirit, that that which was visible in Jesus, that which could be seen with the eyes and touched with the hands, his words and his gestures, the concreteness of the incarnate Word — everything of Him had passed into the celebration of the sacraments.
