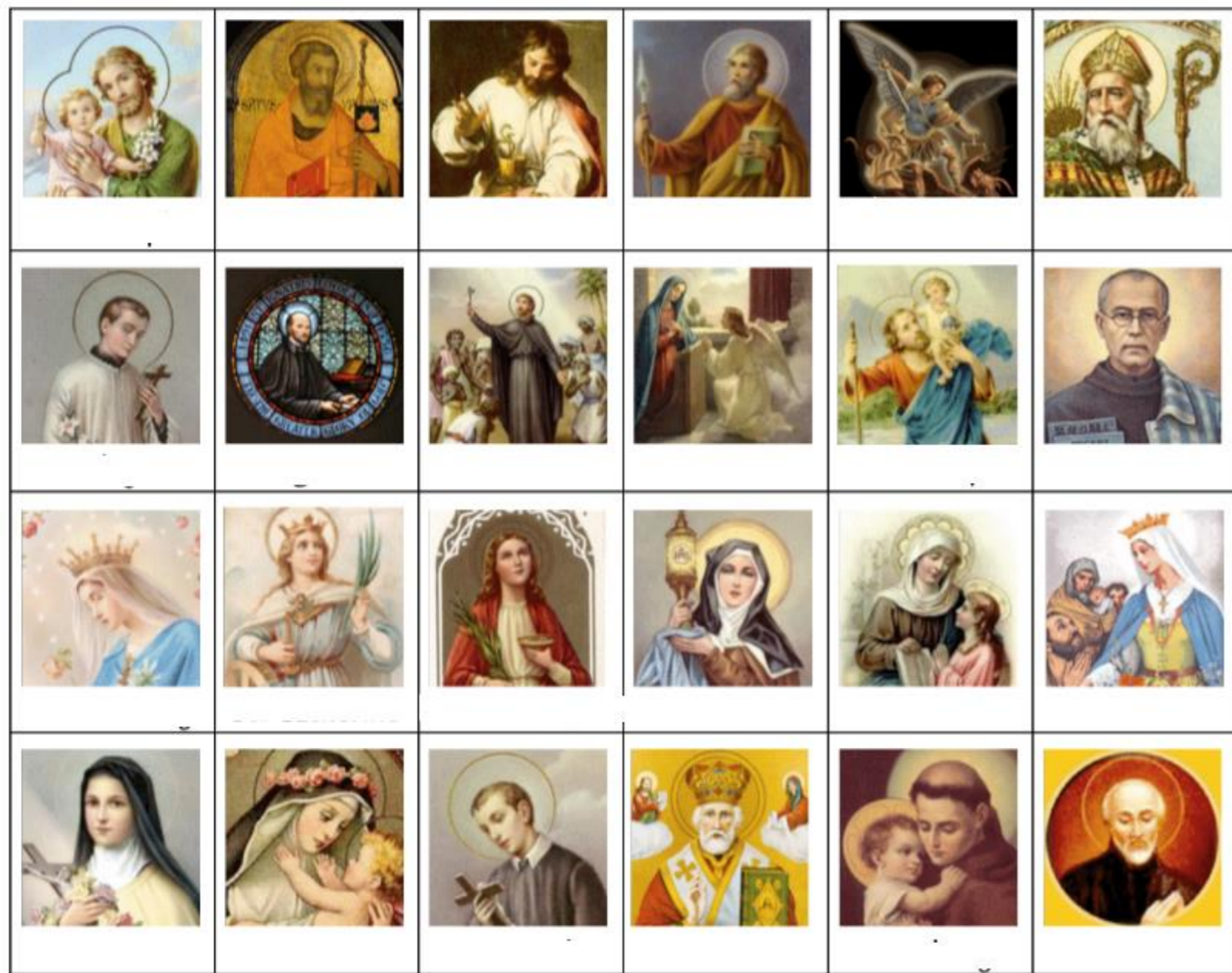

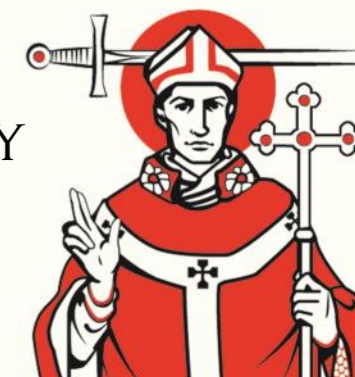

Today's Mass: THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY (Year C)

Wisdom 11: 22 - 12:2, Psalm 144, 2 Thessalonians 1: 11 - 2:2, Luke 19: 1-10

First Reading: this is a hymn on God's power and love. God is merciful because he is mighty. He loves all things that are, hating nothing that he has made, sparing all things, and is immanent (present) in all things.

Psalm: the psalmist blesses God for his power and compassion to all his creatures. This psalm was commonly sung in the early Church at midday meal.

Second Reading: Paul refers to the Parousia or Second Coming of Christ and urges caution. "Any letter claiming to come from us" suggests either a forgery purporting to come from St Paul or a letter of his which is being misinterpreted.

Gospel: the calling of Zacchaeus is only told in *Luke*. The incident fits into three of *Luke's* themes: the problem of riches and what to do about it, the identification of Jesus with 'sinners', and the faith which recognises Jesus as the Lord and the change of lifestyle which results.

The final comment about the Son of Man coming "to seek out and save what was lost" points to what is to come: Jesus is nearly in Jerusalem.

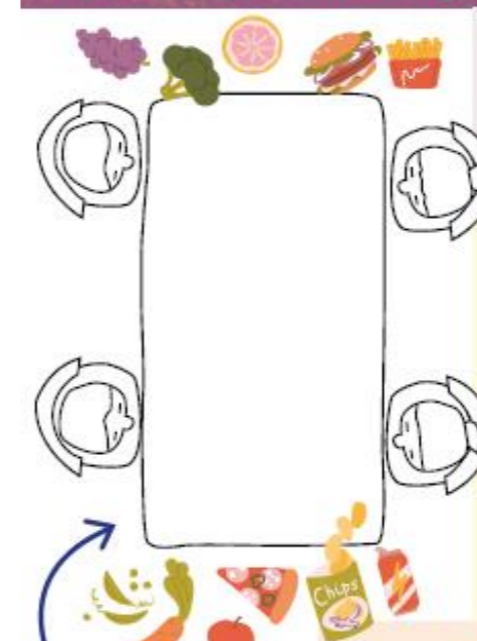

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

Prayer 3

At Mass, just before the Gospel is read, we make the sign of the Cross on our forehead, lips, and heart. These symbolise three kinds of prayer: meditative, vocal, and contemplative.

Vocal Prayer

Jesus taught His disciples a vocal prayer – the Lord's Prayer – and often prayed aloud, in the synagogue and Temple and in the Garden of Gethsemane. *John 17* recounts Our Blessed Lord's 'High Priestly Prayer'. Since we are bodily beings we need to express ourselves orally, and so vocal prayer is important, spoken and sung.

Meditative Prayer

In meditative prayer we use our minds to ponder the will of God and his plan for our lives. "*Meditation engages thought, imagination, emotion, and desire*" (*Catechism* §2708). The Church provides many aids to meditation: Scripture, icons, liturgical texts, hymns and poems, writings of the spiritual fathers, pious websites, and even my scribblings in this Newsletter!

Contemplative Prayer

"*Contemplative prayer ... is a gaze of faith fixed on Jesus, an attentiveness to the Word of God, a silent love*" (*Catechism* §2724). Like all prayer, this form requires a regular time each day or week. In contemplative prayer we rest attentively before Christ, if possible before the Blessed Sacrament, in a time of listening and love.

My own efforts at contemplative prayer are paltry, but Fr Peter is a shining example to us all.

The Work of Prayer

Prayer requires time, attention, and effort. It needs discipline. It is what spiritual writers call 'spiritual combat'. The Tempter will try to draw us away from prayer by introducing acedia (sloth or laziness), distraction, and dryness. The *Catechism* even has a section (§§2725 – 2745) called 'The Battle of Prayer', giving practical advice.

For example, distraction is a major concern for most people who pray. The answer is simply, after finding oneself distracted, to turn back to the form of prayer in which we were engaged, to turn back to the presence of the Lord. A distraction can reveal one's true attachments, but a humble awareness of this can move us to ask Christ to help purify our minds and hearts.

Pray constantly (1 Thessalonians 5:17)

A seeming impossibility, you might think. One answer to this is that this instruction is addressed to the whole

Church. Thus, if you attend weekday Mass - the greatest prayer of the Church – and then other people celebrate Mass in other places, as the earth goes through its daily cycle, the Church as a whole is praying somewhere at all times.

The hours of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in the various churches of our parish also help in this regard. The times are listed on page 2 of this Newsletter; can you commit to coming for one of these hours to pray?

Prayer is centred upon God. Thus we are getting closer to constant prayer if we pray 'thank you' every time we receive a Blessing, if we intercede for every person in need we encounter, if we praise God for every good situation (such as a beautiful sunset), and above all if we see God's hand at work in every aspect of our daily lives.

For your thoughts or for discussion

- What are you doing to deepen your prayer life? Do you use spiritual reading to help your prayer? Do you persevere in your prayer?
- If you don't already do so, can you attend a weekday Mass? Can you pray some of the Liturgy of the Hours (you can find this at universalis.com)? Can you pray the Rosary as a family? Can you attend Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament?
- How is your prayer connected to your Christian life?

Erroneous conceptions of Prayer

Prayer is not simply a psychological activity, to relax us and make us feel better and less stressed. Nor is prayer to be reduced to mere ritual words and postures. It is also wrong to think of prayer as something we do in church but which doesn't relate to our everyday lives. And we should resist the temptations which cast doubt on the usefulness or even the possibility of prayer.

What if our intercessory prayers seem unanswered? Do not be troubled if God does not immediately appear to give what you ask him; he will give you what you need or what is good and at the appropriate time. "*Do not be troubled if you do not immediately receive from God what you ask him; for he desires to do something even greater for you, while you cling to him in prayer*" (Evagrius Ponticus).

We are called to show trust in God like that of sons or daughters to their parents; this is called filial trust. "*Filial trust is put to the test when we feel that our prayer is not always heard, but the Gospel invites to ask ourselves about the conformity of our prayer to the desire of the Spirit*" (*Catechism* §2756).

HALLOWEEN: TIPS FOR PARENTS

Halloween is, of course, All Hallows Eve, that is to say the eve of All Saints Day. But somehow this has been hijacked by the importation of American customs, including carved pumpkins, dressing up as witches, fairies or demons, and trick & treat. This raises significant concerns:

- many children in this country celebrate Halloween but not Christmas (at least as the Feast of Our Lord's Incarnation) let alone Easter;
- the proper reason for Halloween is ignored in favour of the American import of witches etc;
- All Saints and All Souls' Days get ignored;
- tricking and treating can be genuinely frightening for some people such as elderly women living on their own;
- children eat too many sweets because of the tradition of giving trick & treaters sweets, to the chagrin of their parents and dentists.

So what can parents do about it? Some suggestions.

1) Explain what Halloween really means. 'Hallow' means 'holy', as we say in the Our Father 'hallowed be thy name'. All Saints Day is also called All Hallows Day, because it is the Feast Day of the holy or hallowed people (one might say the 'haloed people'), the saints. Explain who the saints are if they don't know.

2) When the children get a bit older you can explain to them that the Catholic Church deliberately placed religious feast days over pagan holidays – Christmas replacing winter light festivals such as the Saturnalia is an example – in an attempt to divert people from pagan to Christian beliefs and practices.

3) One good suggestion is to dress up the kids in saints costumes instead of witches and so on. They can choose their favourite saint and dress up accordingly. This enables them to celebrate Halloween with their friends and so not feel left out but puts the Christian understanding of Halloween back at the centre. Get the children to find information online about their saint (which might be their own Baptismal name).

Above all do not dress up the children as witches or goblins.

4) If you are into crafts and handiworks, you could get the children to draw a saint, paint saints onto eggs, carve a saint or the rosary on to a pumpkin, make a sweets container marked with 'All Saints Day treats', etc. You can find ideas for All Saints family games and activities online, eg at <https://www.catholicicing.com/all-saints-day-party-ideas-for-kids/>.

5) If you have older children Halloween may be an appropriate time to discuss with them the reality of suffering and death and our Christian understanding of what happens after death. On All Saints Day we recall all the holy people who have ever lived, and remind ourselves of the universal call to holiness (as Vatican II put it) so that we can go to Heaven and enjoy eternal happiness with God. On All Souls' Day we pray for all the Faithful Departed, aiding their progress through Purgatory towards heaven.

6) Teach the children this verse

*On the eve of All Saints Day,
Jack-o'-Lanterns light the way.
God's children need no longer fear
the ghosts and goblins gathered here.
For evil ghouls with icy breath
must bow to Him who conquered death.*



Because Halloween has been taken over by the secular world, many Christians have bought the myth that this is a pagan holiday and walked away from this holy time. But Halloween gives us an opportunity to explore, teach, and pass on our faith. This can be done not just by parents educating their children but by everyone at work or in social contexts. **Most importantly, attend Holy Mass as a family on All Saints Day.**
