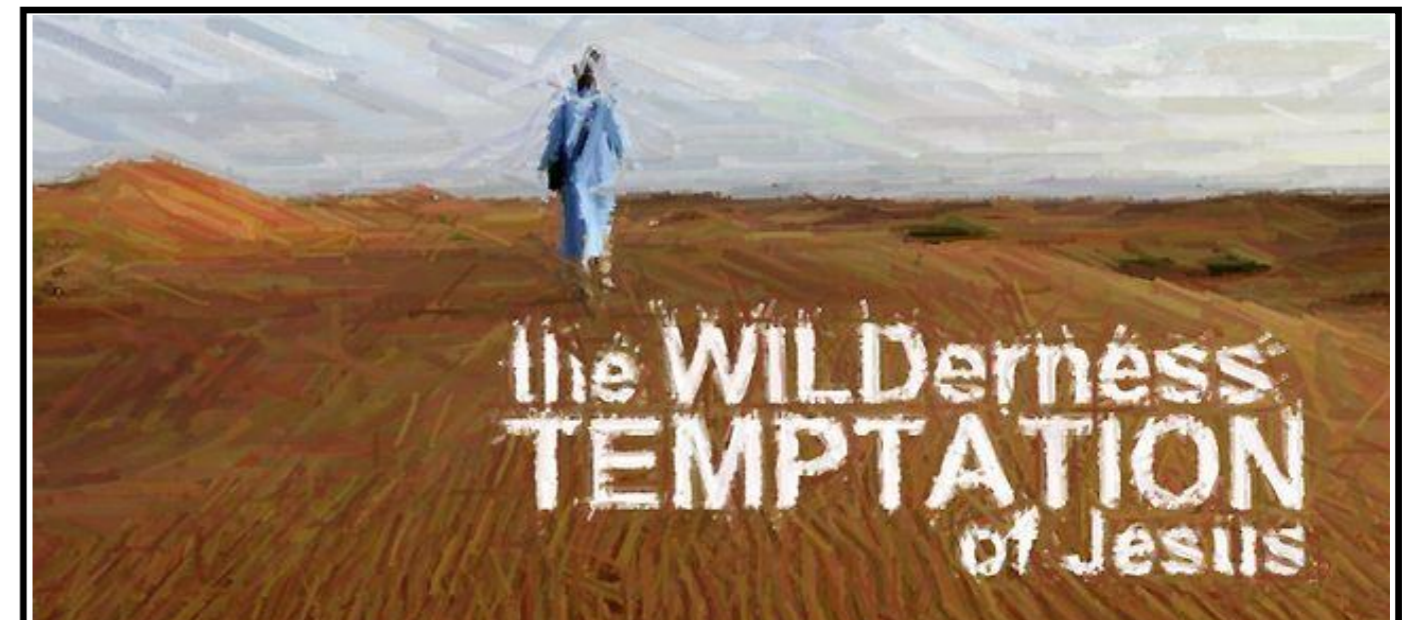

Today's Mass: FIRST SUNDAY of LENT (Year A)

Genesis 2: 7-9, 3: 1-7, Psalm 50, Romans 5: 12-19, Matthew 4: 1-11

The **Gospel** on the First Sunday of Lent is always the story of Jesus fasting in the desert for 40 days and being tempted by the devil. In this Year of Matthew (Year A) we hear St Matthew's account. The first temptation – to turn stones into bread – is tempting Jesus to rely on His own power rather than trusting in God to provide. The second temptation is to put God to the test. The third temptation is to idolatry.

As we begin our 40 days of penitence and preparation for Easter, are we tempted to rely on ourselves rather than God? Are we tempted to complain if God doesn't arrange things as we would like? Are we tempted not to worship and serve God as fully as we ought?

The **First Reading** gives the story in *Genesis* of the origin of our sin and selfishness. If we are being honest, do we not accept that although we try to be good we sometimes give in to temptation? Our disobedience to God results in a break with our intimate relationship with him.

We acknowledge our sin in the well-known words of the **Psalm** (Psalm 50). The priest quotes the sentence beginning "*O wash me more and more ...*" when he washes his hands before the Eucharistic Prayer.

In the **Second Reading** St Paul, reminding us that the result of our sin is the ultimate rupture of our relationship with God - death, tells us that this situation has been undone by Christ's obedience, by His lack of sin.

TODAY

Lent

Purple vestments are worn in Lent, there are no flowers or other decorations in church, and the *Gloria* is not sung on Sundays. The Gospel Acclamation changes to a Lenten form, to avoid the word beginning with 'A', which we won't sing even on Feasts or Solemnities until Easter. This reflects the penitential aspect of this season, as well as its preparatory nature, as we prepare for Easter.

The time now commences for fulfilling the Easter precept (which ends on Trinity Sunday) of making your Confession and receiving Holy Communion. *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* 1389 says

The Church obliges the faithful to take part in the Divine Liturgy on Sundays and feast days and, prepared by the sacrament of Reconciliation, to receive the Eucharist at least once a year, if possible during the Easter season. But the Church strongly encourages the faithful to receive the holy Eucharist on Sundays and feast days, or more often still, even daily.

Friday Penance

The Bishops wish to remind us that every Friday is set aside as a special day of penitence, as it is the day of the suffering and death of the Lord. They believe it is important that all the faithful again be united in a common, identifiable act of Friday penance because they recognise that the virtue of penitence is best acquired as part of a common resolve and common witness. The law of the Church requires Catholics on Fridays to abstain from meat, or some other form of food, or to observe some other form of penance laid down by the Bishops' Conference (Canon 1251). The Bishops have decided to re-establish the practice that this penance should be fulfilled simply by abstaining from meat and by uniting this to prayer. Those who cannot or choose not to eat meat as part of their normal diet should abstain from some other food of which they regularly partake.

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

THE OLD TESTAMENT 1

For Lent I propose to examine some important Old Testament texts and so this week I start at the beginning, with the beginning of *Genesis* (which of course means beginning) and with the story of Creation, the beginning of the universe.

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." And there was evening, and there was morning—the first day. (*Genesis* 1: 1-5, English Standard Version) etc.

The trap is to think that this is an attempt at a scientific explanation of the universe written thousands of years ago by people who didn't know any better, and therefore write it off and dismiss it as ancient mumbo jumbo. This is what critics of religion do: they use a false premiss (that this is ancient science) and then dismiss religion as equally meaningless. If we are to successfully argue with such people we must have a clear – and correct – understanding of the Creation account and other Old Testament texts.

The important point is that this is *theology*, not ancient science. Indeed, it is literary writing written in a pre-scientific era. Clearly this cannot be history; there can be no record of what happened before humans appeared. The fundamental message is that God is in charge: there is only one, supreme God and he created the world with all its inhabitants.

What is unique about this understanding is the belief in monotheism, that there is only one God. All the surrounding nations and religious systems – Greeks, Egyptians, Babylonians, etc – believed in multiple gods. The Mesopotamian belief in a creator god who had to fight a hostile monster, and the sun, moon, and other heavenly bodies worshipped by other near Eastern religions, are all absent. In *Genesis* the heavenly

bodies are part of God's creation and subservient to him.

Interestingly the account of Creation in *Genesis* doesn't explicitly state *why* God created the world. The purpose is, however, implied in the position of mankind in God's plan. The creation of mankind is the last of God's creative acts and is evidently the climax of the whole account. The previous days of creation – light, day and night, plants and animals – are provided for human use: the plants and animals are for our food (*Genesis* 1: 28-31).

Above all human beings are created in God's image and likeness (*Genesis* 1: 26-27). What exactly this means has been endlessly debated, but we can say that it sets human beings apart from all other creatures, and puts mankind in a special and unique relationship with God himself.

Another clue to God's purpose in Creation is given by the repeated statement at the end of each day (or stage of creation): *"and God saw that it was good"*. This is rather like a master craftsman assessment of his handiwork, but the word 'good' also implies usefulness (to human beings) and moral goodness. The subsequent chapters of *Genesis* portray mankind as being rather stupid, prone to rebellion against God, and responsible for bringing evil into the world. It is not mankind which is described as good, but God's creation, his work as a craftsman.

The most commonly accepted hypothesis of creation or existence these days is the Big Bang theory (interestingly, when I was a student many years ago it was still being hotly disputed). There is nothing in *Genesis* which is inconsistent with that theory of physics. The Big Bang cosmological model describes how the universe expanded and how planets etc were formed, but it tells us nothing about before the Big Bang or about the universe's purpose or meaning. For that we have to understand the Judaeo-Christian concept found in *Genesis* 1 that the one God created the universe and, within it, created - and gave a special place to - Humanity.
