

Today's Mass: THIRD SUNDAY of LENT (Year A)

Exodus 17: 3-7, Psalm 94, Romans 5: 1-2, 5-8, John 4: 5-42

The (rather long) **Gospel** today has been chosen to fit in with the first Scrutiny, which involves the unbaptized catechumens (who if they attended the Rite Of Election in the Cathedral were called by the Archbishop to be the 'elect') in one of the stages in their RCIA programme.

A Samaritan woman at Jacob's well encounters Jesus, who speaks of giving "living water" (which, in the Old Testament, is a symbol of godly teaching and salvation). As a result, she recognises Him as the Messiah and rushes off to convert the people of her town, who after listening to Him accept Him as the Saviour.

In the **First Reading** the people in the wilderness complain of thirst, and they test or provoke God. Moses, their leader, then finds water, and names the place Massah ('testing') and Meribah ('quarrelling').

The **Psalm** reminds us of our ancestors' disobedience and asks that "today" we should obey.

The **Second Reading's** theme of love is reflected in the Prayer over the People. This Prayer is a special prayer during Lent, said before the final Blessing, and is designed to ask God to strengthen us as we go out to continue our Lenten discipline.



Restoration of the Chalice

The Archbishop has informed us that parishes in England and Wales may resume Holy Communion under both kinds from the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday onwards, following a decision by the Bishops' Conference. The theological significance of the day when we recall the institution by Our Lord of the Eucharist and the Sacred Priesthood make this a suitable day to reintroduce the Chalice alongside the Host.

The celebrating priest - including a concelebrant - is obliged to receive Holy Communion under both kinds at Mass, in order to complete the Sacrifice of the Mass. By the doctrine of concomitance, the Body and Blood of Christ are fully present in both elements of the Eucharist, so full Communion is to be had in either. However, the Church teaches that the Eucharist "has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds" (Roman Missal General Instruction 281).

This has two implications. First, the choice of whether to receive from the Chalice or not is for the communicant to make (or the parent in the case of a child). We will endeavour to make the Chalice available at Masses as before, but no one is obliged to receive from it. Secondly, we shall need Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to do it, as we used to do; will Ministers please inform the rota co-ordinator at each Church if they are willing and able to administer the Chalice?

While we are on the subject, the Sign of Peace is now resumed, but please be sensitive to other people's concerns; they may not want a physical handshake in this post pandemic world, so a nod of the head might be sensible unless your neighbour in the pew is a member of your household.

MESSAGE FROM FR PETER

Dear Parishioners

Among the many pastoral responsibilities which the Church bears for Her children is that of ministering to them when they are sick, and especially when they are beginning to be in danger of death. The importance of having access to a priest to administer the Sacrament of the Sick for those is this situation

cannot be understated. Occasionally, it may be a source of healing that goes beyond medical intervention; in some circumstances it can make the difference to a person's eternal salvation; and, in all cases it promises the sick person the spiritual graces to endure their suffering in union with Jesus Christ (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church, §\$1520ff; Summa Theologiæ, Suppl. Illae, Q.30).

Knowing the importance of this ministry, it is with a heavy heart that I have agreed to leave Sevenoaks, in answer to the Archbishop's request that I take up an appointment as Chaplain at St. George's Hospital in Tooting. The Archdiocese has struggled to agree a replacement priest with the hospital since Fr. Mark Higgins left last summer, in order to become Parish Priest of Southborough. As a consequence, Catholic pastoral provision at the hospital has suffered. Aware that I have some experience working at St. George's during the Covid-19 pandemic, and am therefore familiar with both the hospital and the chaplaincy team, Archbishop John approached me to ask that I would step into the role and, hopefully, return the Catholic pastoral care at St. George's the largest hospital in London - to full strength.

I am really very, very sorry to be leaving St. Thomas of Canterbury parish, and indeed so soon. I have enjoyed my time here so much and had expected to be here much longer. It has been a real privilege to minister to the wonderful parishioners of this community, and as I move on to new challenges, please be assured I will keep you very much in my heart and in my prayers. I would like to express my deep gratitude to Fr. David for being such a great parish priest to work alongside. I will miss you all very much.

It has been agreed that I will take up my new placement soon after Easter, and, as such, Easter Sunday will be my last day in the parish. Another priest has been arranged to replace me at the same time, and there will be more information about his arrival in the coming weeks.

Please do keep me in your prayers as I begin my new job. Hospital ministry is hard work and I am anticipating a steep learning curve. However, I know that the Lord does not call us to anything without giving the grace necessary for His work.

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

The Old Testament 3: Genesis 6 - 9

"God saw the earth, and behold, it was corrupt, for all flesh had corrupted their way on the earth. And God said to Noah, "I have determined to make an end of all flesh, for the earth is filled with violence through them. Behold, I will destroy them with the earth. Make yourself an ark of gopher wood. For behold, I will bring a flood of waters upon the earth to destroy all flesh in which is the breath of life under heaven. Everything that is on the earth shall die. But I will establish my covenant with you, and you shall come into the ark, you, your sons, your wife, and your sons' wives with you." (Genesis 6: 12-18, ESV).

As with the Creation story we mustn't be over literal in interpreting the story of Noah and the Ark: the chronology is confused and the numbers of animals taken into the Ark contradictory. The story presents us with mankind's sinful nature and of the one God's treatment of it, combining condemnation and severity with mercy and grace.

The word 'ark' only occurs here and once elsewhere in the Old Testament; the usual word for ship is not used. (The word for 'ark' in the Ark of the Covenant is a different word, meaning a chest as in a cupboard.) Noah's ark is, therefore, a special vessel, and one of which God is the architect or designer.

In its Old Testament context, the story of Noah's ark is about God's disapproval of sin and wickedness, about how sinful people get their just rewards (death), and about how God in his mercy will give forgiveness and a fresh start to just men and women, to whom he gives his divine protection and blessing.

The covenant with Noah – of which the rainbow is the sign - is significant: it points to the specific covenant God has made with his people, the people of Israel. For the first time the special relationship between the one God and Israel is initiated. First, this means that Israel must henceforth act morally, that the people of God must obediently follow the law of God. Israel is to be the model or example to the rest of the world of both monotheism and of a morally correct religion.

But secondly, the people of God will in the succeeding books of the Bible develop a ritual understanding of their faith, and this is the point of Noah saving the animals. They are not just for food. The reason for the command to take seven of the clean animals into the Ark rather than the two of the unclean is that they are to be used for sacrifices, that is in worship. If one were to summarise the Jewish religion of the Old Testament one would say that it is categorised by good moral behaviour and detailed ritual observances; both of these start with Noah and the Ark.

But there is more. To the Christian, the story of Noah and the Ark is also about Baptism. The Flood washed away sin and wickedness, and it was only if you were in the Ark that you were saved. Likewise, Baptism washes away our original sin, and it is only if you are in the ark or ship of the Church that you are saved (ie go to heaven). This doesn't prevent God from taking good non-Baptized people into heaven (he is omnipotent after all), but Baptism is the only way which has been revealed to us by Christ by which the promise of eternal life is given to us.

This is why the Prayer over the Water at the Baptism of an infant says this: "The waters of the great flood you [God] made a sign of the waters of Baptism that make an end of sin and a new beginning of goodness".

And there is more still. The story of the Creation in *Genesis* 1 -2 and the story of humanity's recreation through Noah in *Genesis* 6 – 9 make it plain that mankind is but the steward of God's creation. We must therefore take great care of our environment; we cannot destroy the planet because of our greed. The modern concern over climate change and destruction of species is not contrary to Christian belief but *derives from it*. The 'eco warriors' should be reminded that their concerns derive from, and are only possible in, the Judaeo-Christian context. They are jumping on our bandwagon, not vice versa.

PASTORAL MESSAGE FOR THE LAUNCH OF CARITAS SOUTHWARK

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ

I greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus as we continue our Lenten journey towards Holy Week and Easter. In this joyful season of renewal we seek the living water who is Christ himself. With the Samaritan woman in today's Gospel, we believe the Lord Jesus offers every person the gift of eternal life. He shows us that no one is beyond God's love; not you or me; not our neighbour; not the unknown stranger in our midst. The Lord Jesus asks us to be God's love for others, especially those in most need.

Today, I share with you the wonderful news that we are about to launch **CARITAS Southwark**. *Caritas* is the Latin word for love and **CARITAS Southwark** will be our Archdiocesan network to co-ordinate our practical loving service of others, putting faith into action.

Pope Francis said: '.. there is an inseparable bond between our faith and the poor. May we never abandon them.' (EG 48) CARITAS Southwark will work with our parishes and schools to support them in serving those in need. Our volunteers have worked hard to get us to this point of a formal launch in a Mass in St George's Cathedral, Southwark, at 12.30pm on Saturday 18 March. Everyone is invited to the Mass and the reception afterwards.

The Church has always served the poorest and the weakest. This happens today through our parishes, schools and social and charitable projects and organisations. In such challenging times, it is important that we strengthen and enhance our charitable outreach, rooted in our faith in Christ. This will build on the excellent work already taking place and provide encouragement and support for new initiatives. CARITAS Southwark is about facilitation and collaboration, building up our common bond of charity through a more considered identity whereby our Archdiocese can promote and recognise faith in action.

Many parishes already have projects in place. Others, as yet, do not have any specific or developed formal outreach. This is a time for all of us, clergy, religious, and lay faithful, to pray and reflect on the Scriptures, strengthened by the Eucharist, so as to discern how we live out the call to see and serve the Lord Jesus in our brothers and sisters in need. To all who already give their time and effort so generously in voluntary service to the Church's social mission, I extend my heartfelt gratitude.

Across our Archdiocese, a tangible love of neighbour is shown through numerous social and charitable projects. Such apostolates, and new ones which will hopefully come to fruition, require that our hearts be touched by the love of Christ and opened to the needs of others. It is through us, sometimes in simple and seemingly small ways, that the love of Christ becomes real and is freely offered to people in need.
