Today's Mass: ELEVENTH SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME (Year A)

Exodus 19: 2-6, Psalm 99, Romans 5: 6-11, Matthew 9: 36 – 10:8

First Reading: God gives a message to Moses on Mount Sinai. The Israelites are to be “a kingdom of priests, a consecrated nation”; that is to say they will be a nation (when they reach the Promised Land) and through their nationhood they will be dedicated to God as priests are dedicated to God. The covenant to be announced will make this possible.

Psalm: a call to praise God, because he is creator and shepherd of his people, and because of his goodness, mercy and faithfulness.

Second Reading: St Paul describes unreconciled sinners as ‘enemies’. We have been reconciled to God by Christ’s death, but eternal salvation is a future hope.

Gospel: Jesus sends out the Twelve - who are named and who correspond to the twelve tribes of Israel - to preach to Israel about the kingdom of God and to heal the sick, thus imitating Jesus Himself. In the list of the Apostles (Simon) Peter is first – because he is the leader of the Twelve and later of the Church – whereas Judas is last – because he is the dishonourable one.

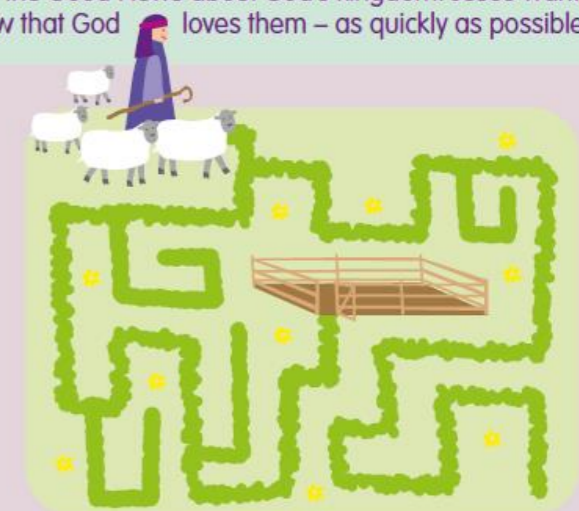

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

Respect Human Life

“Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains for ever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end. God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end: no one can under any circumstances claim for himself the right directly to destroy an innocent human being” (Catechism of the Catholic Church 2258, citing *Donum Vitae* 5).

God's creative action is the source of every life's sacred value, and the Fifth Commandment ('you shall not kill') calls us to do all we can to keep life sacred and forbids murder, euthanasia and any life-threatening acts. In short we are called to promote a culture of life - and the dignity of every human person - and oppose a culture of death. This is particularly important amid the moral confusion in modern society, where choices once considered criminal and immoral have become socially acceptable.

Murder

“Do not cause the death of the innocent or upright” (Exodus 23:7). The Fifth Commandment explicitly forbids murder (indeed, it could accurately be translated as 'do not murder'). Self-defence against an unjust aggressor is permissible, and killing the aggressor is permitted if there is no other solution. Otherwise deliberate killing is gravely sinful. If you murder someone before he or she has repented of their sins, you may be preventing them from enjoying eternal salvation.

Abortion

The Church has always condemned abortion - the deliberate destruction of an unborn child - starting with the first century *Didache*: “you shall not kill the embryo by abortion”. Thus the *Catechism* (2322 -3) states “from its conception, the child has the right to life. The embryo must be defended in its integrity, cared for and healed like every other human being”.

The abortion industry tries to defend its actions by using evasive terminology, like 'terminations', and citing the woman's 'right to choose'; what about the father's rights or the baby's right to life? They say the embryo is 'not viable', but an embryo is a human being; what else is it?

The Church's opposition to abortion is combined with her compassion towards mothers who have had an abortion, often under intolerable pressure. See page 8 for a mother's view on this.

Euthanasia and assisted suicide

Euthanasia is sometimes called 'mercy killing', but regardless of the motive or the means euthanasia consists of putting to death those who are sick, disabled, or dying, and is morally unacceptable.

Doctor-assisted suicide is equally immoral. Instead of killing people we should be actively enabling nursing care (especially palliative care and reduction in pain), professional help for those with psychological disturbances, and supportive pastoral care for people and families in these situations. Proponents speak of the 'right to die'; what they actually mean is the legal right to choose when one will die. They speak of legal safeguards, but experience in several countries where this happens tells us that these are worthless: the poor, minorities, the disabled and the elderly are disproportionately pressurised to yield to this.

The death penalty

Although allowing the death penalty if there is no other way to protect society (see *Catechism* 2267) the Church is not very keen on it, and (to quote the same paragraph) “the cases where the execution of the offender is an absolute necessity are very rare, if not practically non-existent”.

War and Terrorism

Pope Saint John XIII once wrote that peace is a gift from God. While every possible means must be taken to avoid war, there are times when it is justified, and the 'just war doctrine' (first developed by Saint Augustine) applies (google it to find out more). Even amidst a war, the moral law applies: everyone, civilians, soldiers, prisoners should be treated humanely.

Terrorist attacks on innocent people are also an unmitigated evil, and there is no moral justification for them. At the same time we are called to address the causes of such acts, such as violation of human rights, poverty and social inequalities, and frustration and anger.

To summarise, we must always have respect for life, reverence for all other people, and compassion and practical support for those who are dying, in pain, or other great distress in their lives.

DAY FOR LIFE 2023 JANE'S STORY

Voices of women who have had an abortion are often silent in Church and in society. This year's message for Day for Life is written by a woman and hopes to break this silence and offer opportunities for hope, healing and reconciliation.

Jane's Story

I went to Catholic schools, I knew about God and morality on some level, but for me, the culture spoke louder when it came to making decisions around sexuality.

When I was 15, I discovered I was pregnant and the fear clouded everything. I had one aim, and that was to solve the problem I had found myself in. A quick search for confidential help landed me at a clinic connected to an abortion provider. They seemed to genuinely believe that abortion was the solution to my problem and I don't remember discussing any other options. I was relieved when they determined that I was capable enough to make this decision alone, without the involvement of an adult, which is still legal to this day.

That Saturday I travelled alone to the clinic. My parents were unaware, due to other difficulties in the family home that I didn't want to contribute to. I went through the degrading experience of a surgical abortion, and I thought that if I could just get through that day, I would never have to think about it again. I remember feeling conflicted as a tear rolled down my cheek, that I quickly wiped away. I believed I couldn't be sad because this was something I had chosen to do. So after the initial feeling of relief, I pushed down the experience and avoided anything to do with the topic of abortion. It was difficult to be around pregnant women and I found the anniversary difficult each year.

Over the next few years, I became more curious about faith through the invitation of a friend. I was looking for direction and truth, but my spiritual life was always tainted by the thought that I could never be forgiven for what I had done – somehow, God's mercy didn't apply to me. In the fleeting moments of honesty with myself and God, I knew that my choice didn't make me lose something, but someone. At times, this realisation was unbearable. This led to periods of deep depression and suicidal thoughts, as well as more promiscuous behaviour and numbing the pain with alcohol, food, or isolation.

This all changed when I was encouraged to go to confession. Even when I tried to justify my choice, the priest met me with the love and mercy of Jesus. The tears he shed melted my heart of stone. I began to give up my old ways of life and follow His way.

On this journey I was introduced to Rachel's Vineyard: a healing ministry that provides support for those who are suffering after abortion. I remember the kindness of the woman that I spoke to, and I knew I wouldn't be judged there.

It took so much courage to go on a retreat, but I can genuinely say it changed my life. By hearing other people share their stories and being gently encouraged by the team, I was able to speak the truth of what had happened to me on that day. My feelings were acknowledged, including my sense of loss. I was finally given permission to grieve for the baby that had died through my choice. I acknowledged my motherhood and named my son Joseph. This was the start of God turning the guilt, shame and unforgiveness into a deep love for my son, as any good mother would have.

The healing has continued alongside my faith journey. I've taken responsibility for the role I played in my abortion, but with perspective and time, I can see that my 'choice' wasn't really a choice at all. There were other people's failures, and an inability to truly give informed consent as a teenager that also contributed. The option that was presented as a quick fix solution has eternal consequences, and I truly believe that if I'd have known the impact abortion would have had on my life, even as a teenager, I would have made a different choice.
