



### Today's Mass: THIRTEENTH SUNDAY in ORDINARY TIME (Year A)

2 Kings 4: 8-11, 13-16, Psalm 88, Romans 6: 3-4, 8-11, Matthew 10: 37-42

First Reading: Elisha – a wandering prophet - helps a childless woman in Shunem to bear a son. Often in the Scriptures this concept announces the coming of a great Israelite, but here it simply demonstrates the power of the prophet.

**Psalm:** a psalm which is often used in the Liturgy at Christmas; it is a hymn of praise to God for his love and truth, for his justice and favour to his people.

Second Reading: dead to sin and alive to God; this, says St Paul, is the effect of Baptism.

Gospel: Jesus' words about taking one's cross are puzzling: there is no evidence that any of Christ's followers were ever crucified in Palestine. Perhaps we should interpret it more figuratively: disciples of Jesus must be willing to be 'crucified' by their families. Being disowned by parents and family members is a disappointingly common experience of many young Christians. 'Little ones' refers to humble Christians, who are not Church leaders and who may well be poor, but who represent Jesus and are important in God's plan.

From the Desk of the Parish Priest

### From the Holy Land part 2

onday was a relatively relaxed day, visiting Jericho first, claimed to be the oldest town on earth and the place where Zacchaeus climbed the sycamore tree to catch a sight of Jesus. Zacchaeus (whose name means 'pure') is held up as a good example of Jesus' saying "blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God" (Matthew 5:8). Near Jericho is the Mount of Temptation, in the middle of the Judaean desert.

Then on to the River Jordan, and the Baptismal site, where we renewed our Baptismal Promises, as at Easter. This is not precisely where Jesus was Baptized, but it does give a good idea of the nature of the area. Mass was celebrated in the Good Shepherd Church in Jericho.

On Tuesday we transferred to Jerusalem, a place with a rich and, one has to say, an extremely turbulent history. It is a unique place, for it is where the 'tectonic plates' of three major religions coincide. Here was situated the holy Temple of the Jewish people, housing the Ark of the Covenant, until its destruction in AD 70; only the Western Wall survives. Jerusalem is, obviously, the place where our Blessed Lord was crucified and where He rose again. It is also sacred to Moslems as the place where, they believe, Mohammed was raised to heaven. The latter is marked by the famous Golden Dome, which also marks the spot on Mount Moriah where Abraham nearly sacrificed Isaac.

We began at the Mount of Olives, with its magnificent views over the Holy City. After visiting the Pater Noster Church and the Chapel of the Ascension, we had Mass at one of the most exquisite spots in Jerusalem, the chapel of Dominus Flevit. The chapel, in the shape of a tear, commemorates when Jesus wept over Jerusalem (*Luke* 19:21). We descended further to the Garden of Gethsemane, or what remains of the ancient olive grove. Praying where Jesus prayed before His Passion is a very poignant experience.

We continued to Mount Zion, where close by are the Church of St Peter in Gallicantu - where Peter denied Christ three times before the cock crowed, and where there is a dungeon which gives the pilgrim a gruesome insight into Our Lord's suffering before the High Priest the Dormition Abbey - recalling Our Lady - and the Cenacle - a glorious hotchpotch of buildings which commemorates the Last Supper (but can't possibly be the actual original building). Below it is where the Jews venerate the tomb of King David.

The next day consisted of a walking tour of the Old City, beginning with Mass in the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre. As a Knight Commander of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem I have a special connection to this extraordinary Church, which marks the place where Jesus was crucified, at Golgotha (in Greek) or Calvary (in Latin), and where He was placed in the tomb. This is the most important site in Christendom, although the centuries of building and conflict mean that it doesn't look much like 'the green hill far away' of which we sing. But there is strong traditional, historical, and archaeological evidence which supports this as being the place of the Crucifixion and Burial. The interior is disorienting, as different parts belong to different Christian groups: Catholics, Greek Orthodox, Armenian, Ethiopian Orthodox, Coptic, etc.

After that the tour included St Anne's Church and the nearby Pool of Bethesda (see *John* 5: 2-3), the Via Dolorosa (the original Way of the Cross), and the Western Wall (popularly known as the Wailing Wall). The Way of the Cross threads its way through the current city, zigzagging through the narrow and crowded streets. Following the Way - both torturous and tortuous - gives great graces to the modern pilgrim.

The final day of the Pilgrimage began with Mass at the Cenacle, and ended with a visit to Ein Karem and the Church of the Visitation, where Mary visited Elizabeth, before the flight back. Our pilgrimage to the Holy Land brought the Scriptures to life, gave us spiritual inspiration, and strengthened our faith in the 'Holy One of God'.

# FORWORD TO 'LOVE THE STRANGER' A CATHOLIC RESPONSE TO MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES

Scripture tells us: "Love the stranger then, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt" (Deuteronomy 10:19). The word 'stranger' is variously translated as 'foreigner', 'immigrant', 'sojourner' or 'alien'. However, the message remains consistent: those arriving from other parts of the world are our sisters and brothers. We are called to see Christ in them, for all people are created in His image. And we are called to see ourselves in them, for we all share this common humanity.

In 2023, people making dangerous journeys across the Channel to reach the UK are also called by various names: 'refugees', 'asylum seekers', 'migrants', and often by more derogatory terms.

This publication by the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales Department for International Affairs is shaped by, and articulates, our Christian duty to look beyond such labels and see the person who has left their homeland in search of a better life.

When two-year-old Alan Kurdi died in the Mediterranean Sea, for a brief time politicians, journalists, and members of the public across Europe turned their attention to a person with a name and a story. Yet in the years since, how many have died in our own waters without their names or stories ever being known? We should not reduce people to statistics or to a political problem to be solved. Nor can we allow recognition of people's dignity to be dependent upon where they come from or how they reach our shores. The call to love in Deuteronomy is unequivocal and indiscriminate.

Such love, of course, goes beyond mere tolerance. Pope Francis reminds us that loving as Christ does means actively putting ourselves at the service of others. The Catholic community in England and Wales is living this out every day: our charities are caring for people in the asylum system, our parishes are welcoming families through community sponsorship, our aid agencies are providing life-saving assistance to displaced people across the world, and countless volunteers are bearing witness to Christ's love in settings from beachfronts to detention centres. We hope that *Love the Stranger* will support and invigorate this work, for it is not an optional extra but a genuine manifestation of our faith.

As the document makes clear, loving those who seek a home here also means appreciating the fullness of their humanity. Our countries are always better off for the presence of people born elsewhere, who bring their own talents, cultures, and knowledge. Catholic parishes and schools are a microcosm of this as they have been enriched by the presence of families from all over the world. *Love the Stranger* challenges us to not only help those who come here, but also to facilitate and rejoice in their service to our society.

Papal encyclicals and other documents that have been drawn upon highlight the depth of Catholic social teaching in this area. This should guide our response to people who have left their homelands to come to this country. We encourage all Catholics to reflect upon how we can apply this in our own lives, as well as in our parishes, schools, and public life. In doing so each one of us may fulfil our obligation and set an example to others of loving the stranger in the way that God intends.

As we discern this, we ask for the intercession of the patron saints of migrants, and of victims of human trafficking and modern slavery.
