



THE NATIVITY SCENE AND UNCOMFORTABLE QUESTIONS



od transcends human comprehension so greatly that the paradox of His revelation is unsettling. The Israelites sought a simpler, more human-like god. Paradoxically, the Incarnation of the One only complicated matters.

For millennia, humanity had no problem filling the concept of "god" with meaning. He was someone powerful, immortal, capricious, yet appeasable with sacrifices. But the God who reveals Himself to Abraham is not particularly interested in sacrifices per se; He seeks a living, faithful, and committed relationship. Gone is the convenient commercial arrangement (e.g., man to god a sheep, god to man rain); one must trust in His mad promises, even if there's little human reason to do so (Sara laughed upon hearing she would bear a son). This Revealing God, nameless and unrepresentable in any accepted way, responds evasively when asked His name by Abraham's grandson and blesses him. Even to Moses, He introduces Himself as "I Am Who I Am," an un-name, and strictly forbids any likeness of Himself.

Yet. He is not, as Eastern thinkers might describe. mere energy or formlessness. He doesn't expect us to dissolve into Him; instead, He engages with us, expects reciprocity, behaving like a person. So, "Quis est Deus?" (Who is God). God's word and Tradition suggest some attributes: perfect, unchanging; eternal, existing before creation; a creator, ruler of all; a lover of life, whose glory is the living human; unique, supreme; just, faithful to His covenant with man, and merciful, upholding His commitments even when His people failed. Infinitely patient, yet uncompromisingly consistent.

But when St Francis first built a nativity scene, he wanted to show the extent of God's humiliation. contemporaries had no problem understanding the concept; they tangibly felt their finitude and the fleeting nature of earthly things. They lived in a materially poorer world, less socially and economically stable, more dependent on annual harvests and natural disasters. Even those worshiping gold and power felt, at least, fear at the thought of death and facing the Creator.

Today, the Infant in the manger can help us discover something else. That scene should discomfort us. Not because it's unhygienic laying a newborn where animals feed is shocking. He's totally dependent, disease-prone. When offered a finger, he reflexively grabs it, as if asking, "Can I trust you?" Hungry, he opens his mouth and cries loudly for his mother if she's absent. His cry is his only defense. This is familiar: we sing about it in most carols.

So, what is shocking is that he is God. If the concept is empty to us or never thought about, we'll be momentarily moved, then move on. Yet, the nativity is a scandal, one of history's biggest. In the 13th century, it asked the faithful if they contemplated the Incarnation. Today, it asks if we understand who was incarnated, the immense distance He traversed, limiting His divinity, and His great trust in earthly parents. If we're not shocked by its sight, it questions our understanding of "God" and who/what is in our pantheon of gods.

The Triune God is beyond human measure, even though one of His Persons became human. As C.S. Lewis described Aslan, He's not a fully tamed Lion and will remain so eternally. This is unsettling, taking away the luxury of saying, "I know, I understand," but offers the chance to participate in the endless adventure of knowing Him through a relationship He constantly invites us to
